OPEN SESSION

David Farrar, President & Vice-Chancellor, welcomed everyone to the first Senate Meeting of the 2024/25 Academic year. D. Farrar added that it is great to be back on campus and to see our students return to campus, and to experience the energy and excitement they bring with them.

D. Farrar acknowledged that we meet today on the traditional territories of the Mississauga and Haudenosaunee nations and within the lands protected by the Dish with One Spoon wampum agreement.

D. Farrar reinforced some points from his message to the McMaster community, which was posted on the Daily News last week. The central message is that McMaster must be a place where everyone can belong. These polarizing global issues are extremely difficult to navigate but it is our responsibility to find a way to do so that is inclusive and respectful to one another. Over the last few months, a great deal of commentary and correspondence has been received regarding the encampment that took place on our campus. While it is clear that some members of our community experienced this as a peaceful, non-threatening, inclusive event, it is also clear that other members of our community felt targeted, threatened and afraid. These are both valid lived experiences. As a university community we need to acknowledge and accept the diverse range of responses to such polarizing events and create an environment that upholds freedom of expression alongside our values of building community and embracing diverse voices and perspectives.

September 30 is the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. From September 23 to 27, there will be a number of events on campus to commemorate this important day, and to deepen our understanding of the history and continuing impact of the residential school system. Details will be available on the Daily News in the coming days.

D. Farrar informed Senators that Elder-in-Residence Bertha Skye, sadly passed away in July. Bertha was a Cree Elder who provided invaluable guidance, friendship, and support to many in the McMaster community. She played an integral role in shaping the growth and success of the Indigenous community at McMaster. Bertha's cultural teachings, kindness, and wisdom were an inspiration to many, and she will be missed.



On October 5, the McMaster Students Union (MSU) and Student Affairs are reintroducing a day of Homecoming events to kick off the fall term. This is a great opportunity to welcome our students back to McMaster and foster community and connection on our campus. Events include the Homecoming football game, which will see McMaster take on the Western Mustangs. There will also be an afternoon of activities for students including the world's largest obstacle course. This will be followed by an evening concert on JHE field.

Last week, Judah Denburg, Hendrik Poinar and Louis Schmidt were named Fellows of the Royal Society of Canada. Nathan Andrews, Michelle Kho, Matthew Miller and Hsien Seow have been named members of Royal Society of Canada's College of New Scholars, Artists and Scientists. This is a great achievement, and all were congratulated.

D. Farrar acknowledged Daphne Maurer, a Distinguished University Professor from the Department of Psychology, Neuroscience and Behaviour, who was recently appointed to the Order of Canada. This is a tremendous accomplishment, and congratulations were offered.

A member expressed interest in how we navigate different perspectives and difficult challenges while balancing responsibilities like freedom of expression and peaceful assembly. They noted that they sensed some tension in the statement around occupying space on campus and that there is a commitment to campus being a space for dialogue, sharing ideas and controversial issues. They asked where the University stands around that and the right to peaceful assembly. D. Farrar agreed that there is a right to peaceful assembly and that those in the encampment were not threatened, but others walking around campus felt threatened and it had a real effect on campus. There is a difference between peaceful assembly and taking over a part of campus. Peaceful assemblies are allowed, but we will not allow an encampment to form.

Members discussed how people feel threatened for multiple reasons, it is not a reason to remove the right to protest, and that it is important not to outwardly dismiss the voices of those who felt threatened.

8. Communications

a. Preliminary Enrolment Figures



Matheus Grasselli, *Deputy Provost*, and Steve Hranilovic, *Vice-Provost and Dean of Graduate Studies*, provided a verbal report on the preliminary undergraduate and graduate enrolment figures.

M. Grasselli explained that McMaster University continues to be the University with the second largest number of applications in the province. There were over 70,000 applications which was an overall increase of 2.5% from last year. There were 7% more offers than last year and 6% more acceptances than last year. Most of the applications, 58,000, were from domestic students and international applications were down across the sector. There were 12% less applicants, 10% fewer offers, and 15% fewer confirmations. M. Grasselli noted that all the Faculties did a good job and that there was only a 5% decrease in the international student registration compared to last year. M. Grasselli explained that McMaster's targets were aspirational for this year and changes from the Federal Government impacted international student enrolment. Currently McMaster is 4% over target in registration and 10% above target for domestic students. The total undergraduate enrolment at all levels is relatively flat at 31,000 with domestic being up by 1% and international down by 13%.

A member asked for clarification around how the target is set, by whom, and whether consideration is given to resources such as faculty numbers, seats and buildings. M. Grasselli explained that the targets are set by consultations with a number of individuals and Deans. They consider capacity, teaching and infrastructure, examine the international market, consult with Student Affairs, Financial Affairs and recruiters. It then goes to Provost Council and the Provost sets the final targets.

In response to questions around the corridor funding, residence and financial implications, M. Grasselli explained that McMaster is currently above the corridor funding. Sean Van Koughnett, *Associate Vice-President (Students and Learning) & Dean of Students*, explained that there is always a wait list for residence. When Lincoln Alexander Hall is completed, all first-year students will be offered a space in residence pending no increase in enrollment. Currently, residence offers are based on admission averages and communicated on a student's offer letter. Susan Tighe, *Provost and Vice-President, Academic*, explained that not meeting the international targets does impact McMaster's revenues and examining the impact on revenues has begun. Going into the budget cycle for the fall, financial prudence will continue to be needed. S. Tighe noted the importance of retention. Some institutions are down significantly in their international student numbers. S. Tighe gave credit to the recruiters in the Faculties and centrally who helped to bring students to McMaster.



S. Hranilovic explained that as of September 6, 2024, overall enrolment in graduate studies was stable. In Engineering there was a 4.2% increase, Business and Health Sciences remained stable, and the other Faculties decreased. International student enrolment stayed steady and S. Hranilovic noted that graduate students are exempt from the caps put in place.

A member noted that there are variables that impact international enrolment such as the Federal Government increasing the minimum deposit for visas and the increase in the length of time to obtain a visa.

9. Report from the Faculty of Humanities

D. Farrar explained that approval of by-laws is a three-step process and today is the first step with 'approval in principle'. Next the By-Laws Committee will review and approve the by-laws before bringing them back to a Senate meeting for final approval.

Pamela Swett, Dean, Faculty of Humanities, presented the report.

P. Swett explained that the proposed revisions to the By-Laws include basic housekeeping, the updating of titles, the addition of committees and revisions to simplify the elections process.

It was duly moved and seconded,

that Senate approve, in principle, the amendments to the Faculty of Humanities By-Laws and refer the amendments to the By-Laws Committee for review.

The motion was Carried.

10. Other Business

a. Request from the Committee for Recommending a President

Heather Sheardown, *Vice-Chair, Committee for Recommending* a President, provided an overview of the report. H. Sheardown explained that the Committee has been working diligently and is making good progress. The Committee is requesting an extension to the nine-month timeline as their work will not be completed by the deadline.



It was duly moved and seconded,

that Senate approve an extension of the nine-month reporting deadline for the Committee for Recommending a President until December 31, 2024.

A member asked for clarification around the extension. It was explained that the original nine-month deadline took the Committee to September 30, 2024, and they are requesting an extension until December 31, 2024.

The motion was **Carried**.

A member raised a concern around one of the appeal files in the closed session. The member noted that the student lost their appeal and there is a concern around the pattern of all students losing grievances, especially against their supervisor. The member stated there is an urgent need for consistent supervisory guidelines across the University, noted the power imbalance and that students feel unsupported. There are concerns around the length of time to schedule the hearing and the length of the actual hearing meeting. The member asked to revisit the structure of the Student Board for Senate Appeals.

D. Farrar advised that the item is in closed session and that the issues raised were not on the agenda so not all the information is available. This item will be brought back after consulting with the Secretariat.

Members echoed their support of the concern noting the structural power dynamics.

S. Hranilovic added that the graduate supervision component of teaching needs to be nurtured and supported. Graduate students have unique relationships with supervisors. S. Hranilovic noted that there are initiatives to make students aware of their responsibilities and rights. There are Associate Deans in all Faculties who provide support.
