

Report #1

T. Russell Wilkins Memorial Scholarships Post-experience Report

During my internship in South Africa, I had the privilege of travelling alongside three other colleagues under the supervision of the Pan-African Collective for Evidence (PACE). We were recruited for a project focused on the intersection of artificial intelligence (AI) and gender-based violence (GBV). This experience offered an invaluable opportunity to delve into the cultural, social, and health contexts of South Africa, while also contributing to important research that aims to propel South Africa's society forward.

Our primary role involved data extraction and coding research papers to understand participants' experiences with GBV. We focused on identifying key characteristics such as the type of gender-based violence, participant demographics, the nature of interventions, and the outcomes. Reading and analyzing the lived experiences of individuals affected by GBV was eye-opening, as I learned how pervasive and multifaceted this issue is.

In addition to these responsibilities, we also discussed the ethical considerations of using AI, which deepened our understanding of how technology can be harnessed responsibly to address complex social issues. The overall aim of this project is to develop a chatbot that can guide GBV victims to take action and receive care. We had the opportunity to provide input on refining the data models being used, which gave me the chance to contribute in a more hands-on way.

Beyond our research work, we had several social engagements with the PACE team, which were a highlight of the internship, as they enabled me to form lifelong friendships and gain a deeper understanding of the work methodologies and team dynamics. The supportive environment at PACE fostered collaboration and open dialogue, making it an enriching learning experience both professionally and personally.

In addition to our professional activities, we had the opportunity to explore some of South Africa's most significant landmarks. We visited the Apartheid Museum in Johannesburg, where we learned about the country's history of injustice and resilience. During our visit to Soweto, the largest township in South Africa, we toured Nelson Mandela's former home and conversed with locals. Despite the challenges of poverty and underdeveloped infrastructure, the vibrant sense of community among the residents was palpable. We also embarked on a safari at Kruger National Park, where we enjoyed game drives and observed the stunning wildlife and scenery. Our time in Cape Town was equally memorable. We hiked up Lion's Head, which offered breathtaking views of the city and coastline. We also visited the Kirstenbosch National Botanical Garden, where we were surrounded by the region's incredible biodiversity. Throughout our travels, we immersed ourselves in the vibrant local art scene, admiring everything from beadwork to paintings and wooden sculptures, and supporting small businesses.

This internship not only broadened my understanding of GBV within the South African context but also provided a rich cultural experience that expanded my worldview. The combination of academic work and cultural exploration made this an opportunity of a lifetime, one for which I am deeply grateful. I owe this experience to this generous scholarship that made it all possible.

Foundational Competencies and Tools for Equity-Based Co-Creation Proposal for Non-academic Microcredentials

Rationale/Importance of Training

Co-creation approaches, such as co-design and co-production are increasingly recognized as a best practice approach to power-sharing and collaboration between service providers and service users from diverse groups, recognizing the specific insights each group can provide to improve health and other public services (Moll et al., 2020). There is currently a significant demand for Equity-Based Co-Creation (EqCC) among employers within the health and social service sector. Health Standards Association and Accreditation Canada (2023), for example, launched a new strategy in 2022 that emphasizes the importance of inclusion and collaboration with patient partners as essential elements in providing quality of care. As such, advancing equity, diversity and inclusion (EDI), and incorporating the patient voice into health system design is embedded into the strategic plans of healthcare organizations across the province.

There is a labour market gap in training related to inclusive approaches to co-creation. Over the past two years, our team, the McMaster Equity-based Co-Creation Hub, has received an increasing number of requests for training from a range of health and social service organizations, including small community services, hospitals, Home and Community Support Services (formerly known as LHINs), and agencies who support newcomers, Indigenous youth, and persons with disabilities. We have secured letters of support from a range of organizations supporting diverse communities (e.g., Regional Diversity Roundtable, North York General Hospital, Health Canada, Mental Health Commission of Canada, Inclusive Design for Employment Access) who see the importance of EqCC, but are searching for tools to do this work, and for 'lived experience experts' (service users who face barriers to inclusion) to support the process.

There is a need for training among both service providers and service users to build knowledge and skills in EqCC. This includes upskilling current service providers in the health and social service sector, creating new positions for 'patient partners' to provide input into service design, and ensuring that trainees entering the field are prepared to meet demands for equity-based approaches to service design and delivery. For learners, microcredentials provide an efficient, flexible way to build their skills in this growing field from a credible educational institution.

For McMaster University, and the McMaster Equity-Based Co-Creation Hub, the microcredential program provides a 'value added' learning opportunity that recognizes expertise within our faculty, responds to a need in the community, and provides an opportunity for modest revenue generation.

Our target learning audience will include: a) current service providers and decision makers in health and social services who have an interest in and are involved in service design and delivery with equity-deserving communities; b) 'experience experts' who have experienced challenges in the system (individuals with disabilities, recent immigrants, Indigenous and racialized communities) and who have experiences that could inform system re-design, but face barriers to engagement, and c) current students who plan to work in health and social service sector and

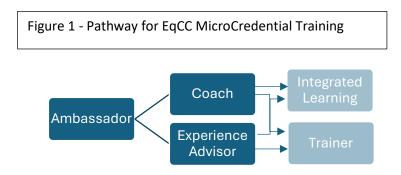
have an interest in EqCC. Funding for initial development is provided by the Ontario Ministry of Colleges and Universities, so our initial focus will be local and provincial, with an opportunity for an onsite session with the Coach and/or Experience Advisor courses. There is, however, an opportunity to expand nationally and internationally given the global connections with the McMaster EqCC. The Ambassador program is online and asynchronous, therefore can be widely available. The Coach and Experience Advisor courses are designed to be offered online, but in cohorts over a series of 9 consecutive weeks. The discussions are asynchronous, therefore we are able to accommodate learners who may have other work or school commitments or who may be in different time zones.

Learning Pathway

Our overall plan is to build five distinct, but related non-academic micro-credentialling opportunities that in the future could be combined into an Equity-Based Co-Creation (EqCC) certificate:

- MC1 EqCC Ambassador (entry-level foundations);
- MC2 EqCC Coach (more intensive tools and strategies to implement principles into practice);
- MC3 EqCC Experience Advisor (tools for lived experience experts from equity-deserving communities to participate in co-creation);
- MC4 An integrated learning experience (community fieldwork placement); and
- MC5 EqCC Trainer (skills to train others in EqCC).

Our focus in the next year will be to build and pilot three initial microcredentials; the EqCC Ambassador, EqCC Coach and EqCC Experience Advisor. Specific content and activities in these courses will be co-created with input from our EqCC Centre community (includes trainees, clinicians, policy makers, service users, people with lived/living experience).



Although our goal is to develop five courses, at this time we are seeking approval for only the first three. The plan is for the first three courses to be delivered in 2025/2026. Development of the final two courses will follow if the initial courses are successful. Each course is stand-alone, meaning it will be offered independently of the others and will issue its own microcredential badging upon completion. However, the courses are also sequential. All participants must complete the entry level Ambassador program as a prerequisite to completing either MC2 (coach)

or MC3 (experience advisor), depending upon their learning needs. MC2 and MC3 will run in parallel, with an opportunity for cross-learning and collaboration on project work in the final two weeks of the course. This will provide an important opportunity to apply their learning (coaches learning to work with experience advisors and vice versa).

Completion of either MC2 or MC3 is required in order to participate in MC4 (integrated fieldwork experience) or MC5 (train the trainer). Development of MC4 and MC5 will be considered at a later date, depending on the success of year 1.

Microcredential Information

Overview:

The McMaster Equity-Based Co-Creation (EqCC) Ambassador is an entry-level online course designed to highlight foundational principles and practices of EqCC, to prepare the trainee to become an ambassador for this knowledge within their community or organization.

This microcredential course will take approximately 5-8 hours to complete. The format will be asynchronous, using online self-study to maximize accessibility. Trainees can work through the course materials at their own pace within the allotted time frame, with no need to log in at a specific time. If there are questions, they can reach out to a course instructor.

Learning Outcomes:

By the end of this course, learners should be able to:

- Define their own positionality and describe its potential impact on interactions with equity-deserving communities
- Identify and honour a range of worldviews, through listening, acknowledging historical harms, unlearning harmful myths, and valuing lived experience)
- Plan for how to engage in critical allyship with equity-deserving communities

Attaining Learning Outcomes:

Attainment of learning outcomes will be supported through:

- Instructional videos, readings, and case study examples
- Multiple choice questions as "Knowledge Checkpoints" after each section
- Reflection prompts throughout the learning experience

Evaluation of Learning Outcomes:

- LO1 Defining positionality and impact on interactions with equity-deserving communities
 - o Personal action plan will include a personal positionality statement
 - Positionality statements are an important tool to facilitate awareness of multiple identities based on group memberships, roles and personal values and characteristics, and to consider how these lived experiences and perceptions may influence interactions with others. It helps to make transparent what shapes our work.
 - Opportunity to apply learning from module on positionality and selfreflection with knowledge checkpoints
- LO2 Identifying and honouring a range of worldviews

 - Opportunity to apply learning from modules on equity-deserving groups,
 Truth & Reconciliation and reciprocity/critical allyship

 - Personal action plan will include identification of strategies to engage with equity-deserving communities within and outside their network.
 - Opportunity to integrate and apply learning from modules Critical Allyship and Ambassador skills

Evaluation:

Learning outcomes will be <u>assessed</u> through a final "Personal Action Plan" assignment, which includes creating a positionality statement, reflecting on stereotypes and historical harms that affect their target communities, and generating a plan for having conversations with people within and outside their networks. Evaluation is pass/fail, with feedback on strengths & areas for improvement provided by a course instructor.

Completion Requirements:

To receive this non-academic microcredential, learners must complete all learning and evaluative components. The microcredential course will be assessed using a pass/fail model.

Delivery Format:

Sessions will be delivered online via asynchronous activities using the Avenue to Learn platform. Note: We will explore Teams as an alternate option during the pilot testing process.

Credit Toward Another Credential:

Completion of this course is a prerequisite for the EqCC Coach and EqCC Experience Advisor microcredentials.

Upon completion of the sessions including relevant assessment, we will issue a digital certificate of completion. The certificate will outline the specific skills, competencies and specialized learning from the program, via a tamper-proof, directly verifiable credential that includes the issuing institution, date earned, learning outcomes and evaluation criteria

Course Evaluation:

The McMaster Equity-Based Co-Creation Centre will distribute a student course experience survey to gather feedback on the value of the course materials and facilitation.

Instructors/facilitators:

We will hire a part-time instructor with expertise in EqCC who will review the Personal Action plan. Faculty members affiliated with the McMaster Equity-based Co-Creation Centre will oversee the evaluation process.

The focus of this course is on building capacity to apply the skills of Equity-Based Co-Creation (EqCC)with diverse, equity deserving communities. It will build on foundational knowledge from the Ambassador course, with more in-depth skill development in co-design/co-creation, as well as understanding the core principles and practices of inclusive design.

This microcredential course will take approximately 10 -15 hours to complete over a 9 week period. The format will be a combination of virtual synchronous sessions (at the start and the end of the course), asynchronous learning modules with an online discussion board, and collaborative group work at the end of the course to apply principles in practice. There is an option for an in-person session at the end of the course if there are local participants.

Upon completion of the sessions described above including relevant assessment, we will issue a digital certificate of completion. The certificate will outline the specific skills, competencies and specialized learning from the program, via a tamper-proof, directly verifiable credential that includes the issuing institution, date earned, learning outcomes and evaluation criteria.

Microcredential Information

Overview:

The focus of this course is on building capacity among individuals with personal experience of inequities and injustices to overcome barriers to engaging in co-creation processes. To enroll, they must have lived experience as a service user (or family caregiver) who has experienced barriers to accessing quality care. This course will build on foundational knowledge from the Ambassador course, with a more in-depth exploration of the design skills and strategies from the perspective of lived experience.

It will parallel the Coach course in terms of the number of hours and mix of both asynchronous and synchronous elements. A planned overlap with trainees from the Coach will enable the two groups to learn from each other since this congruent with the principles and practices of co-creation. Since trainees in this course will be from equity-deserving communities who face structural barriers to service delivery, we will be intentional in building a flexible schedule with access to a range of accommodations (e.g., closed captioning, translation, assignment extensions etc.) and financial bursaries as needed to attend. Course development will draw upon principles of anti-racism, and trauma-informed pedagogy.

This microcredential course will take approximately 10 -15 hours to complete over a 9-10 week period. The format will be a combination of synchronous sessions (at the start and the end of the course), asynchronous learning modules with an online discussion board, and collaborative group work at the end of the course to apply principles in practice. Two sessions in this course will involve an interactive session with EqCC Coach participants.

Upon completion of the sessions described above including relevant assessment, a microcredential (non-academic) badge will be issued in digital format.

Learning Outcomes:

By the end of this course, learners will be able to:

- Reflect on the value of personal experience and positionality
- Identify and articulate needs for accommodations if/when relevant
- Communicate their perspective with others to foster and inspire change
- Apply strategies to maintain personal boundaries, health and well-being

Attaining Learning Outcomes:

Attainment of learning outcomes will be supported through:

- Instructional videos, readings, and case study examples
- Multiple choice questions as "Knowledge Checkpoints" after each section
- Discussion board posts
- Reflection prompts throughout the learning experience
- Two synchronous co-creation sessions

Similar to the Coach training, there will be a combination of self-study, an online moderated discussion board, and synchronous collaborative sessions with other trainees and instructors.

Sessions will be delivered online via synchronous and asynchronous activities with an option for in-person participation (weeks 7 & 8) if local cohort.

The final grade for learners will be "pass/fail." Feedback will be provided from instructors on the reflections and action plan.

The McMaster Equity-Based Co-Creation Centre will distribute a student experience survey at the end of the course to gather feedback from learners regarding the relevance of the course content and facilitation.

A co-instructional model is proposed, with an academic instructor as well as a community member from an equity-deserving community (service provider and/or service user).

Budget & Resources

Revenue from Tuition

The EqCC Ambassador program will ideally be offered three times a year, with approximately 25 trainees per cohort for a total of 75 graduates per year. Graduates must complete this initial course to be eligible to enroll in the other EqCC training programs.

Ambassador course Proposed Fee: \$250 @ 75 trainees = \$18,750

We estimate that 20-25% of trainees who complete the Ambassador program will proceed to the EqCC Coach or EqCC Experience Advisor training. Both of these micro-credentials will be offered twice a year with approximately 10-15 people per cohort, for a total of 40-60 trainees per year across both programs.

Coach course proposed fee: \$750 @ 20 participants: \$15,000

Experience advisor proposed fee: \$500 @ 20 participants: \$10,000

The total annual numbers at steady state is estimated to be approximately 160 students annually across the 3 microcredentials. If 115 pple = \$43,750

Note: A bursary/scholarship program will be developed for people with lived/living experience to access to offset or cover the tuition costs for the course in order to optimize accessibility.

Expenses

- *Admin Coordinator (manage student enrolment, marketing, links with community partners)
 - \$25/hour x 10 hours/week x 52 weeks + FB = \$13,000 (+ 25% fringe benefits)
- Learning Management System (Avenue, Teams or Moodle) no cost
- **Verified micro-credential system no cost (sponsored by DeGroote)
- Instructor/evaluator academic (30 hours per course @ 1.5% teaching based on standard stipend rate of 10% (200 hours) = \$1500) (for each of the coach & experience advisor courses add 5 hours for reviewing submissions from Ambassador trainees)
- Instructor/evaluator Community member (30 hours/course @ 1.5% teaching load based on stipend rate noted above) = \$1500 (for each of the coach & experience advisor courses)
- **Overhead & administrative costs associated with managing funds (online registration receiving/managing tuition fees, instructor payment, income disbursement) = \$6000 Total expenses: \$24,000

NIHI provides professional development training for health care professionals across Canada. This microcredential adds to existing programs based on the McMaster Continuing Education and NIHI collaboration.

Change Leadership offers a concise yet comprehensive overview of strategies for effectively leading organizational change within the healthcare sector. This course emphasizes the importance of vision and strategy, a focus on people, and clear communication in leading effective and meaningful change. Key topics include planning and implementing change, measuring progress and success, overcoming barriers, and fostering a culture that embraces change. Relevant examples from health care are explored, such as changes for integrating artificial intelligence tools and modernizing healthcare workforce practices. Change Leadership provides an ideal opportunity to develop skills in guiding people, teams, and organizations through transitions while respecting their needs and fostering a culture that values and adapts to change.

Learners will complete their 10-12 hour training program with NIHI, and, upon completion of the required hours and relevant assessment, MCE will issue a microcredential (non-academic) in digital format.

Course Description

Module 1: Being a Consultant (3 hrs)

In this module we define what a consultant is and define their role. No longer are consultant's fractional leaders, the modern consultant must involve others and be collaborative to achieve their objectives. A consultant needs technical, interpersonal, and consulting skills to be successful.

Module 2: Common Contracting Challenges (3 hrs)

This module would largely focus on how to address low and changing motivations. It would cover motivation theory and negotiations principles.

Module 3: Internal vs. External Consultants the Difference (3 hrs)

There are important differences between and internal consultant (an employee who typically works laterally) and an external consultant (the classic definition). This module will explore how those differences impact the phases of a consultation.

Module 4: Phase 1 – Contracting (3 hrs)

This is the matchmaking phase. In this stage the initial problem is identified, consultant-client fit is determined, expectations are discussed, and the general approach is discussed. This phase is critical to the success of the following phases.

Module 5: Pitching Your Idea (3 hrs)

This module will take you through the process of planning and executing a pitch presentation. You will learn how to use industry software and hardware to create a pitch deck to its full potential. You will practice your pitch and get feedback from your peers and instructor to improve your presentation skills.

Module 6: Phase 2 – Diagnosis & Discovery (3 hrs)

In this module, the landscape or environment is assessed to define the scope of the problem and the project. This involves identifying key factors including people, time and methodology. A significant portion of this stage focuses on data collection.

Module 7: Phase 3 – Feedback & Decision-Making (3 hrs)

This module focuses on the reporting and planning processes that follow diagnosis and discovery. It addresses the various factors influencing client involvement at this stage. The module outlines the project and guides decision-making on how to proceed, including whether to advance and the methods to use.

Module 8: Resistance to Change (3 hrs)

A key indicator of success in consulting is effectively managing resistance to change, which is a natural human response. In this module we investigate the forms of resistance and strategies for addressing them. Resistance is not overcome; like everything else is this process, it is addressed collaboratively.

Module 9: Phase 4 – Implementation & Engagement (3 hrs)


This module focuses on implementing the plan, which may involve diverse approaches and different segments of the client organization. It usually encompasses a learning or change management process and can require varying degrees of consultant involvement.

Module 10: Phase 5 – Extension, Recycle, or Termination (3 hrs)

In this module, we cover the evaluation that takes place post-engagement. After evaluation the project may be extended to a larger part of the organization, this is called extension. If a root cause issue is discovered, the process recycles and begins again. Otherwise, the project is terminated.

Introduction


I am pleased to present the Ombuds Office Annual Report (the "Report") covering casework from the period of May 1, 2023, to April 30, 2024.

The Ombuds Office (the "Office") has a broad mandate to advance administrative fairness and equity principles as they relate to policies, procedures, and decision-making that affect students. We consider the three main aspects of fairness when reviewing matters - relational, substantive, and procedural. The Office is founded on several key precepts including impartiality, confidentiality, and independence. The principle of independence is reflected in the reporting and funding structure of the Office. The Ombuds reports to both the President of the University and the President of the McMaster Students Union (MSU) and is otherwise independent of the administrative hierarchies; and the Office is jointly funded and supported by both the University and the MSU, with the Graduate Students Association (GSA) agreeing in principle to providing future financial support commensurate with their membership. In recent years, the McMaster President's Office has provided additional funding for an Assistant Ombuds position. To advise the Ombuds and aid in fulfilling its unique mandate, the Office is supported by an Advisory Committee consisting of student, staff, and faculty senator representatives.

The Report contains statistical information about the visitors to the Office, the nature of the concerns, and the ways in which we assisted in the resolution of conflicts and concerns as well as trends we have observed, and recommendations aimed at improving fairness for students.

Types of Cases


The Office received 543 cases and enquiries between May 1st, 2023, and April 30th, 2024. Cases refer to concerns and complaints that are student related. Enquiries refer to matters that are related to the university but are not student-related (outside mandate) and matters that are not university-related (outside jurisdiction).

Who Contacted the Office

The Office was contacted by a total of 407 students, former students, learners, and applicants; 35 staff and faculty; and 101 individuals outside the McMaster community.


Why Visitors Contacted the Office

Like previous years, the most common academic issues for undergraduate students involve course and program management, grading and evaluation methods, accusations of academic dishonesty, and accommodation for students with disabilities.

There was a total of 761 issues for the period of the Report. The number of issues is larger than the number of cases because a matter may have more than one issue.

Undergraduate Students

Of the 761 issues handled by the Office, undergraduate students brought a total of 445.





Graduate Students






Learners, Former Students, and Applicants

56 issues were brought by learners, former students, and applicants. Below is a breakdown of these issues:



Faculty and Staff

Faculty and staff contacted the Ombuds Office about 39 issues. In cases unrelated to students, we provided information and referrals as appropriate.



External to the University

A total of 101 issues were raised by individuals outside our jurisdiction such as parents, non-McMaster community members, or the Ontario Ombudsman's Office. This number is higher than usual due to concerns related to the Israel-Palestine conflict. Many of those external to the university who contacted the Office did so as part of a campaign where the same email was sent by different individuals. For statistical purposes, we only counted the first email received from a campaign so as not to distort our overall numbers.



How We Helped

The actions reported below are based on the 746 issues identified within the 536 closed cases and enquiries*.



Many concerns are resolved with referrals to appropriate resources on campus. In the majority of cases, I provide "advice" which may include any or all of the following actions: actively listening to a visitor; identifying and analyzing the issues; reviewing the relevant policies, procedures, and regulations; generating self-directed options for resolution; and/or coaching a student on how to communicate effectively with an instructor or decision-maker. Because being engaged in a conflict or the perception of unfair treatment can impact a student's well-being, I gauge how well a student is coping and inform them of campus mental health and other supports as required.



Interventions


In some situations, and at my discretion, some form of intervention in a matter may be warranted. As the Office has a high level of confidentiality, I would only become involved in a matter after I have obtained consent from the visitor. This year, I intervened in connection with 58 issues. When intervening, I operate informally and beginning at the lowest level within the institution as possible to achieve an early resolution to a matter prior to a formal process being initiated by a student. This informal intervention involves approaching a decision-maker to clarify a situation, discuss fairness concerns, explore options for resolution, or recommend a fair outcome. If my intervention does not resolve a matter, I provide guidance to the visitor on formal dispute resolution avenues within the university such as the <u>Student Appeal Procedures</u>.

In situations where a student has exhausted all university processes, where there is no avenue within the university to resolve a matter, or where there are concerns about the fairness of a university process, the Ombuds operates formally as an "office of last resort". In this capacity, I may conduct a fair and objective inquiry or investigation, attempt to resolve a matter and, if necessary, make formal recommendations that, if not accepted, can be escalated up to the highest level within the institution and/or be included in the Ombuds annual report.



Intervention Outcomes

In many cases, students resolve matters independently after getting advice from the Office. Where I have communicated with a university decision-maker or official to resolve a matter, we record the outcome as either resolved or partially resolved. In some cases, my intervention involves clarifying information or discussing concerns and, therefore, no further action is required.



Activities of the Office

This has been another busy year for the Office. We developed a new Ombuds website (ombuds.mcmaster.ca) that is more accessible, easier to navigate, and contains additional information and resources helpful to students. In the spirit of continuous improvement, we attended several webinars and workshops relevant to our work. Below is a summary of other activities of the Office:



"Minor" Problem

A student approached the Office in their final year of study after declaring a minor using the appropriate university form and learning their request had been denied. They explained that they had sought the advice of an academic advisor in a previous year to determine the courses required to receive a minor, all of which they had taken. The student was frustrated because they had followed the advisor's instructions and based their course selection on their advice. The student met with the relevant administrator and was informed that the interpretation of the rules had changed and, as a result, they would have to take additional courses to achieve the minor.

Although the student had the option to launch a formal inquiry under the Student Appeal Procedures, I agreed to look into the matter in the interest of finding a more timely and efficient informal resolution.

After discussing the fairness issue with the relevant administrator, they agreed to "grandparent" students who had been given advice based on the previous interpretation of the calendar regulations. The Ombuds involvement not only resolved the issue for the student who visited the Office, but also for those students who were similarly situated, thereby ensuring fairness and equity for all impacted students.

Document "Drama"

I was approached by two international graduate students separately about missing original documents from their home universities that they had provided to McMaster in 2019 in support of their applications for admission. Due to pandemic-related factors, the students delayed requesting their documents until 2023 and, by the time they did, the university administrators were not able to locate them despite several searches. The administrators concluded that the documents were destroyed as would be the case for admission documents no longer required. After making inquiries, I learned that the university has since changed its practice and does not retain any original documents from students, so I did not consider this matter to be systemic in nature.

The students reported that they had received email responses from different offices with conflicting information about where the documents had been stored after they were submitted, and, for this reason, the students held out hope the documents were still in existence. Given the students' lack of a timely request for the documents that were of such great importance to them, even when taking into consideration the impact of the pandemic, I did not conclude that the university had treated them in an unfair manner in destroying the documents; however, I agreed with the students that the communications they had received left a faint hope that this was not the case.

Because of the communications they received and the fact that the documents in question were original paper academic records and were extremely difficult to replace, I agreed to look into the matter. My intervention included following up with the relevant offices to better understand where the documents may have been stored, escalating the matter to a more senior administrator, and offering to conduct a search myself. In the end, an additional search was conducted by a university official, and the missing documents for both students were found. As in many other cases, the Ombuds relies on the support, goodwill, and cooperation of university administrators to resolve student issues.

Observations and Recommendations

Part of the role of the Ombuds is to suggest changes to existing policies, rules, or procedures that appear unclear, inequitable, or unfair, and offer advice on the development of new ones. The Provost convened four working groups to respond to the recommendations in *the 2022-23 Ombuds Office Annual Report*. The working group reports are available on the Office of Provost's website.

Course and Program Management

This is a broad category encompassing issues students encounter with the administration of a course or program and continues to be one of the largest areas of concern reported by both undergraduate and graduate students.

Instructor Departure

Several undergraduate students attended the Office with concerns about two different courses in which the instructor had left the university before the course was completed. In both cases, some of the responsibilities of the instructor had been assigned to another member of the instructional team, a teaching assistant and course coordinator, respectively.

While the students understood that the university had no control over the decisions of their instructors to leave the university, they expressed concern that a replacement instructor had not been provided and the remainder of the course did not unfold as anticipated based on the course syllabus. According to students in one of the courses, the remaining in-person lectures were replaced with video recordings, the number of assignments was reduced from five to three, and the test they took earlier in the term was not returned until very close to the final examination date leaving them little time to prepare.



Recommendation:

That the <u>Undergraduate Course Management Policy</u> state that any significant changes to a course such as the departure of an instructor, require the department chair or director to ensure students receive appropriate communication along with an updated syllabus that, in cases where the instructor has left the university, includes the name and contact information of the individual who is responsible for the course, along with any changes related to the evaluation or delivery method.

Instructor Use of Generative Artificial Intelligence (Generative AI)

Generative AI makes it possible for machines to learn from experience, adjust to new information, and perform human-like tasks. As this technology evolves and becomes more integrated into many aspects of society, including higher education, university policy continues to develop. The university has created the <u>Artificial Intelligence (AI) Advisory Committee</u> that serves as a strategic body to guide the university's endeavors related to AI. Concerns about the misuse of Generative AI have become an emerging issue in our casework.

Evaluation and Pedagogy

Several students have raised concerns about the use of generative AI in their courses to provide evaluation and feedback on their work. They claim these evaluations are often inaccurate with marks being given for incorrect answers and vice versa. As the marking irregularities typically benefited students, resulting, on average, in higher grades than they should have received, the visitors believed these issues were, by and large, not being reported by students. The learning experience was the most serious concern for the visitors as they were of the opinion the feedback was sometimes erroneous and left them feeling more confused about the course content.

The university has provided non-binding guidelines on the use of Generative AI in courses that includes the following:

Generative AI tools should not be used to provide grades (letter or numeric) for student work. Generative AI tools may be used to provide feedback on student work, provided the following conditions are met:



- When generative AI tools are used to provide feedback of student work this use must be explicitly included in the course syllabus.
- Students should have the ability to opt-out of AI generated feedback.
- Al generated feedback must be checked for accuracy and bias before being returned to the student.
- Documentation of the AI tool used for feedback is required.
- Instructors, or teaching assistants when directed, are responsible for feedback, however it is produced, to ensure appropriateness and accuracy.

Recommendation:

That the <u>Undergraduate Course Management Policy</u> includes the permitted instructor use of Generative AI in courses along with a requirement that instructors provide detailed information on the syllabus about how it will be used in the course.

Student Privacy

In a related matter, a student approached the Office with concerns about their privacy in connection with a course requirement that their work be submitted to a third-party company and for which no information about how their privacy would be protected was provided. The student reported these concerns to the department and were told to contact the company directly to find out about its privacy policy. When the student did so, the company responded that the student would hear back in 60 to 90 days.

The university has provided the following guidelines with respect to privacy protection in the context of Generative AI use in courses for teaching and learning:

- If using generative artificial intelligence in courses or for teaching and learning activities, educators and students should use institutionally supported tools that have a completed Privacy and Algorithmic Impact Assessment. McMaster has an enterprise license with Microsoft Copilot. Educators and students who use generative AI should use their McMaster single sign-on credentials to login to Microsoft's Copilot.
- In selecting third-party technology tools educators must avoid those that sell student data to companies building large language models, as well as companies that use student data to train AI models or to improve services and products; educators should review user agreements and consult with the Office of Legal Services or the Privacy Office if unsure.

Recommendation:

That the <u>Undergraduate Course Management Policy</u> state that instructors who use generative AI in their course provide information in the syllabus on students' rights to opt out of using third-party generative AI technology tools.

Graduate Student Issues

One of the concerns noted by the of the *Task Force on Graduate Funding* report, is that the time to completion for doctoral degrees across many disciplines exceeds the four-years of full-time enrolment for which doctoral students are typically guaranteed funding. One of the concerns brought to the Office by graduate students is that they are being "slowed down" in their efforts to complete their degree by ancillary activities they have been assigned by their supervisor. These may include applying for research grants; corresponding with journals and editing manuscripts for multi-author publication submissions; mentoring masters and undergraduate students or training them on how to use equipment; booking meeting rooms or other administrative tasks; and/or performing routine duties associated with running a lab.

A doctoral student whose research was being conducted in their supervisor's lab, reported that when the lab manager left the university, the position was left vacant, and the manger's not insignificant responsibilities were divided up among the supervisor's graduate students. Given the inherent power imbalance between students and supervisors, most students are reluctant to refuse to do assigned tasks even when they believe their progress is being hampered as a result.

While there is perhaps an argument that many of the supplemental activities assigned to graduate students contribute to the professionalization process, the benefit to a student of these tasks and the potential impact on their progress are not typically considered by the supervisory committee when conducting evaluations.

Recommendation:

That to increase transparency and decrease the likelihood of a graduate student being assigned excessive or unreasonable tasks that unnecessarily slow their time to competition, the graduate regulations stipulate that all supplemental responsibilities assigned to a student by their supervisor be communicated to the student's supervisory committee and recorded in the annual committee report.

Academic Integrity Sanctions

In a recent adjudicator decision under the <u>Academic Integrity Policy</u> in which a student was found to have committed plagiarism, the student was given educational penalties in addition to standard punitive sanctions: the student was required, among other things, to spend time at the <u>Writing Center</u> to review proper attribution methods. I applaud the use of educational sanctions as they acknowledge the role that skills and knowledge gaps may play in some acts of plagiarism, particularly for a first offence. While educational sanctions should not replace efforts on the part of the university to put in place preventative educational measures to ensure all students are aware of proper citation methods, I encourage instructors and faculty adjudicators to consider the appropriateness of educational sanctions when responding to acts of academic dishonesty.

Recommendation:

That the *Academic Integrity Policy* explicitly references educational sanctions as an option for decision-makers to use either instead of or in addition to punitive penalties.




With gratitude



SUBJECT: Status of the Ad Hoc Committee on Course Management

Given the breadth of the changes that we have identified and the consultation that still needs to happen, I am writing to inform members of the Undergraduate Council that the meetings of the Ad Hoc Committee on Course Management will be paused, and we will extend the timeline for bringing forward changes to governance.

We will not bring changes forward to governance in 2024/25 and instead will extend our workplan and aim to bring changes forward in 2025/26.

In the interim, we will continue to work on the following:

- 1. We will prepare guidelines for Universal Design in Learning that increase awareness of how to build accessibility into our teaching. This work will be informed by the STEER/R funded project led by Kate Brown which will bring forward recommendations in winter 2025. It will be good to normalize and build support for these approaches before embedding them into a policy. I think that we risk getting pushback if we change policy first and so we will focus on the culture shift. This is a similar approach that we have taken with the generative Al guidelines. The suggested guidelines will allow room for discussion ahead of putting anything into our formal policies.
- 2. We will prepare a plan to engage with instructors on some of the suggested changes that we have identified so far. We have a draft survey, but it will benefit from more targeted questions based upon the discussions from this committee.
